Her lens allows her to observe their behavior and communication enhancing her ability to predict and capture their essence. She understands intuitively the spirit and nature of the animals she photographs. A spirit that is evident in each of her photos.

From last November through to February of this year, Sue dedicated her time to capturing the magical moments of these magnificent creatures. "The Many Faces of the Squamish Eagles" exhibition at the Squamish Library is a perfect venue for her to share her experience with others.

Q & A with **SUE BANSEN**

Q: Describe this exhibit. What was your creative stimulation for this particular series?

A: My exhibit, "The Many Faces of the Squamish Eagles," was born out of four months of observing and photographing the Eagles that reside in Squamish over the winter. Each photograph tells a compelling story, illustrating the resilience and grace of the Eagles as they navigate their environment. The exhibit captures the intricate and awe-inspiring moments of the eagles' lives, their behavior, and communication.

Through these images, I hope to convey the power, vulnerability, and emotional richness that define the lives of the Squamish Eagles.

Q: What is your background? How long have you been doing art?

A: My background is in communication, counselling, and psychotherapy. I have worked both in clinics and private practice for over 45 years. I also worked as a behavior consultant to the school board in Ontario. When I retired from the school board, I had more free time to explore my other passions, including watercolour, wildlife photography, and writing. I do not have any formal training in wildlife photography. I rely on the observation skills that I developed through my work as a therapist. These abilities allow me to predict behavior and capture breathtaking moments.

Q: What is most important to you in your art?

A: One of the primary goals in my creative process, whether in art or photography, is to evoke a genuine response from the observer. When I am painting or photographing, I pay close attention to the atmosphere present at the moment of inspiration. I intend to convey this atmosphere authentically, so that those who engage with my work can sense the unique feeling of that time and place. In photographing wildlife, my focus is on capturing the emotion or essence of each animal. My goal is to reveal a glimpse of their inner world so that the observer can experience the spirit of the creature as I witnessed it.

Q: What does your work aim to say? Does your work comment on social or political issues?

A: The central aim of my work is to share the sense of wonder that I feel for our planet. By capturing images of wild animals in their natural habitats, I aim to highlight the intrinsic beauty and fragility of the natural world.

Presenting beautiful images of wildlife brings attention to the urgency of their protection and the ecosystems they inhabit. I hope my photography acts as a subtle commentary on the pressing issues of conservation.

Q: Who are you hoping to engage with your art?

A: I hope to engage people of all ages. If my photography can spark reflection, conversation, or even a fleeting sense of wonder in someone, I feel I've created something worthwhile.
